School tributes after death of lollipop lady

A POPULAR lollipop lady who served the formal Queen at **banquets** before retiring to help kids safely across the road has died suddenly.

Tributes have been paid to Carole Tilbrook, 72, who worked as a school crossing patrol officer at Rokesly Infants and Juniors Schools for nearly a decade.

She suffered a heart attack at home in Nelson Road, Hornsey, at about 1.30am on Wednesday, June 9 and died shortly after.

Carole lived in Hornsey for 35 years and took up her job at Rokesly after retiring as a silver service waitress.

Her husband of 22 years, Ronald Tilbrook, 70, who was with her when she collapsed, said: "She loved the children, unfortunately she couldn't have any of her own, but she loved the children and they loved her and that's it really."

She had been out working on the school crossing at the corner of Rokesly Avenue and of Rokesly Avenue and Hermiston Road just hours before her death.

The children were told the sad news the same day and plans for

in her memory are underway. Bola Soneye-Thomas, head teacher of Rokesly Juniors, said: "Carole was more than a 'lollipop lady' – she really cared and looked after the pupils of Rokesly Schools.

"She made a great number of friends not only with the children but also with their parents. She will be greatly missed. It will be hard to replace

A parent added: "She was a pillar of the school and lots of people liked her. She was just a smiling face at the start and end of every day.

Carole was born in St Pancras and entered the catering trade when she left school working as a silver service waitress until she retired.

She catered formal banquets at Buckingham Palace Guildhall, serving the Queen, Princess Diana, and other royals, as well as Welsh singer Tom Jones and other famous faces.

Carole met her husband when they were both walking dogs in Priory Park in Hornsey, where he worked as a warden before retiring, and they married in

Rarely apart, the couple were both active members of the Royal British Legion and were standard bearers in parades.

"It sounds silly I know, but she was everything a person could wish for," said Mr Tilbrook. 'She was wonderful, I sure do

The funeral procession will leave The British Legion in Elder Avenue, Hornsey, at 3pm on Friday passing Rokesly School for a final time before a Southgate Crematorium at 3.45pm.

Carole is also survived by sisters Diane and Angela, as well
